
If you are on a trip with Tash you know you will be in safe hands! We recommend you look for a First Aid Kit that is easy to store and can be accessed easily.

A comfy bed on wheels with easy rear step entry, full slide out kitchen and storage.






Brian and Leonie were happy to show their **AVAN - Pop Up camper**.



It was overcast when we got up and it was 14 degrees overnight. The possible shower that we thought might happen did not and there was no condensation so the tents were dry. David had a go at metal detecting around the campsite after breakfast and found a 1979 twenty cent piece and an old bottle.

We were on the road at 8:15, and soon came across a mud hole, the first of several. Ross ably instructed us on how to manage it and we all got through ok.

There was plenty of donkey poo around but we didn't see any.

We carried on to the picnic site by the three dams for lunch and Maria left us to head back to Perth via Coolgardie

After a walk up the granite to take some photos of the dams we headed East past the campsite which had several campers. We soon came to a big mud hole but managed to find a chicken track, but it also had a muddy section, rather than bog hole. Ross walked it and we figured it was doable and we all managed to get through first time with no problems.

The track had sections where you could do 40-50 km/hr but then there were a couple of other bog holes that we had to take the "chicken track".

We made it to Sunday soak and stopped to have a look at the lonely graves of Thomas Cantwell and Jerry O'Conlan who both died of thirst in December 1895 on their way to Coolgardie. Further East there signs of mining, with many side tracks and blue metal in the potholes. Onto the highway at Higginsville a quick run to Norseman, where we refuelled before heading across the causeway towards Hyden.

As we passed through the burnt out areas from the big fires a couple of years ago, it was difficult driving into the setting sun with dust reducing visibility.

We stopped at the Woodlands campsite at 1720 which luckily wasn't burnt. We found some good campsites and put the tents up just before sunset in a stiff cold wind.

Luckily the wind dropped and the night cleared as we sat around the fire.

# **Woodland Wanderings**


## Day Four- Monday 18 April Daniel Bedo

I got up at 5:30 after our coolest night of the trip with the temperature at seven degrees and erratic bird twitters in a subdued dawn chorus. The wind from last evening had dropped resulting in a pleasant morning to watch the sun rise as I prepared breakfast and coffee before breaking camp.Our Woodlands campsite was beautifully timbered; a small patch left unburnt by major fires. We departed just after eight driving on the well maintained road towards Hyden. The impact of fire was clear with bare grey trunks poking two to three metres above sparse scrubby regrowth. Ross pointed out that the Gimlet tree crowns had been burnt off but the fire failed to continue down the trunk possibly because of high wood density. After leaving the burnt area changes in vegetation type and density unfolded as we progressed.

Our first stop was at Disappointment Rock, a low granite dome akin to those we had visited earlier but smaller in scale. The climb was deceptive with the convex shape of the rock giving the illusion of a receding summit. A leisurely climb provided good views over the woodlands with Mcdermid Rock prominent in the distance. Under the shelter of a group of weathered boulders there was a carpet of hardy plants using the protection and accumulated water to survive a harsh environment. We stopped here partly to discover the origin of the rock's name but none of the "interpretive" signs we saw revealed it. Perhaps that is the disappointment!

After a brief tea stop at Lake Johnson we saw the road verges pockmarked with hundreds of crater-like ant nest mounds made of pale yellow sand contrasting with the brown gravel.These continued for many kilometres before we reached the eastern edge of the wheat belt. Several columns of smoke rose over the wheat fields as farmers burnt off stubble before sowing seed. The smoke mostly spread out horizontally at an inversion layer looking like grey curtains hanging over the farms, Occasionally some smoke broke through the inversion layer rising above it in a bulbous cloud.

After lunch and refuelling at Hyden it should have been a routine drive home but my radio produced a loud howling sound with each reception then there was a long period of silence. Joy, who was behind me, passed for no apparent reason then a few km on Ross pulled off the road and we all stopped. I then discovered my radio was not transmitting and I had lost contact with the convoy. Joy had tried to indicate a problem when she overtook but I didn't see it. I continued using a handheld radio until we had a break at Brookton. Here I quickly discovered the antenna connector had worked loose; the radio worked perfectly after tightening it.

Continuing on towards Perth was uneventful. Ross formally ended the trip at Karragullen where we said our goodbyes and went separate ways. From here the traffic swelled with an interminable drive home through the city. It contrasted with the uncrowded conditions we enjoyed for the trip.

After a few km of well maintained gravel roads we arrived at the historical Carrolup Native Settlement and Marribank Mission which was part of the Stolen Generations of aboriginal children. Opened and closed several times through the decades, the settlement went through various forms including a Farm training school and Baptist mission in the later decades of its operation. Exploring the settlement was both interesting and sobering to get an understanding of an era of Australian history not often discussed.


# Kojonup Kamp Out


